The Senior Chaplain's Notes

My dear friends,

This issue of TOGETHER covers both the final few weeks of the penitential season of Lent and also the fifty days from Easter Day to Pentecost which make up the great and joyous season of Easter. At the heart of this sacred time, we find the seven most solemn days of the liturgical year – the seven days of 'Holy Week'.

The former Dean of Westminster Abbey, Michael Mayne, used to say that we can learn more about God and God's love for us, understand more about the ultimate human questions, and be changed more profoundly during the hallowed, disturbing and ultimately joyful period of Holy Week than in the whole of the rest of the year put together.

I think he was right. Because in Holy Week we have an opportunity to appropriate the timeless truth's of Christ's passion, death and resurrection for ourselves and in our own lives. In Holy Week we can receive our Palm crosses and sing 'Hosannas!' just like the Jerusalem crowd. We can take our place at Christ's table for the Last Supper on Maundy Thursday. We can wait at the foot of the cross on Good Friday and we can, ultimately, experience the joy of the resurrection on Easter Day. To turn again to Michael Mayne, he put it like this:

'This is not play-acting. This is a slow-motion spelling-out and meditating upon the great acts of God we rehearse at each Eucharist. This is how I meet God and respond to his love. This is how I discover what God has to say about my life, my suffering, my death, my resurrection.'

It's quite an opportunity. And, on the centre pages of this magazine you will find full details of Holy Week and Easter services in each of our congregations. May God give us the grace to participate as fully as we can in these holy mysteries.

With every best wish and blessing for a fruitful Lent and looking forward to a joyful Easter-tide.

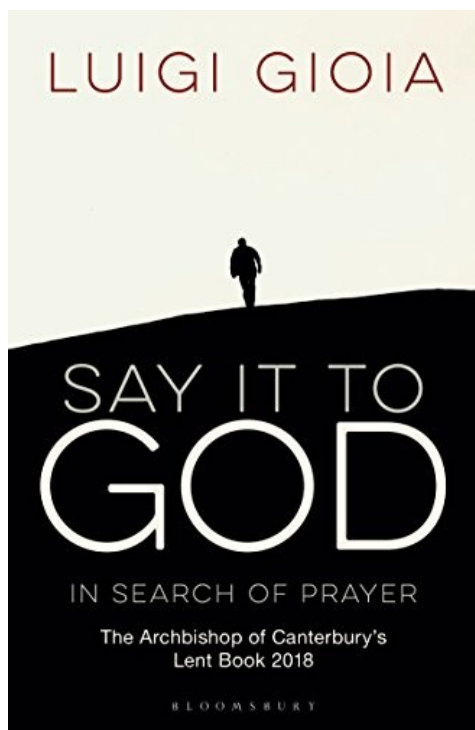
Bergen notes

It is hard to believe the seasons of Advent and Christmas have already come and gone! It has been a nice winter here in Bergen with colder temperatures that have kept some of the rain

away. Praise the Lord! However, the colder temperatures produced probably more snow and ice than some would have liked! Our carol services lived up to the annual hype once again as we nearly doubled the attendance from last year in our service in Korskirken and there was not a single seat available when the service began in Mariakirken. We are so grateful for all of the time and energy put in by our Christmas choir and our choir director, Roger Martin. These annual carol services are such a blessing to our congregation and the Bergen community.

The season of Epiphany offered us a spiritual eddy of sorts after the intensity of Christmas as we found time to slow down to reflect upon Christ coming into our broken world. We did this well this year as we brought back an old tradition of a Christingle service on the second Sunday of Epiphany. The scheduling of this service during Epiphany is a date we plan to keep. It works well to have this kind of service once the hustle and bustle of Christmas has passed. The service was led by our lay reader Iris who offered a very insightful sermon explaining the Christian symbolism of the Christingle along with other intercultural Christingle traditions throughout the world. And of course, I have to mention that her husband Per played a vital role in the service. In fact, he literally saved the day as he somehow managed to engineer a small electronic candle onto all of the Christingles just an hour before the service began (we are not allowed to use real candles in Mariakirken). Thanks, Per!

As we begin to turn our hearts and minds towards Lent, our congregation is looking forward to a new tradition. We will hold our first ever (hopefully annual) Shrove Tuesday pancake supper in Mariastuen! We will even be racing one another while flipping pancakes! Probably best to do this before consuming as many pancakes as our bellies will tolerate! Then after giving ourselves 24 hours to digest the pancakes, the next day on Ash Wednesday we will hold a joint ecumenical service with the Norwegian congregation in Mariakirken to begin Lent. We will also be reading a book entitled *Say it to God: In Search of Prayer* by Luigi Gioia in our Lent study, which will take place on three consecutive Monday evenings leading up to Holy Week. The study will again be bookended with a soup and bread supper and compline. Similar to last year, during Holy Week we will hold a



Maundy Thursday communion service, a Good Friday Tenebrae service, and then celebrate Easter morning with the Norwegian congregation in a joint service in Mariakirken. So, lots to look forward to as we move into the season of Lent.

Lenten and Eastertide blessings to all of you out there! May the God of new life and hope continue to nurture and sustain us in our mission here in Norway! Be well, friends.

Trondheim notes

In Trondheim, we bury the 'Alleluia' on the last Sunday before Lent. The children hold up the letters A-L-L-E-L-U-I-A during our last sung Gloria until Easter. The letters are then wrapped in a violet-coloured cloth and the word fasted from during this reflective season.

On Shrove Tuesday, the day before the fast begins, we gather for a BYOT (bring your own topping) pancake dinner. After the feasting, we compete in a Shrovetide Quiz, with questions such as: What does it mean to be shriven? What does Fat Tuesday mean? Where do the ashes used on Ash Wednesday come from?

During Lent, we will continue our long-time tradition of Lenten Study Gatherings. Meeting weekly to break bread and eat soup, discuss our Lenten book—this year John Pritchard's *Something More: Encountering The Beyond In The Everyday*—and closing with Compline (Night Prayer). It is a joy to have opportunity to share in Compline together at Lent – it's such a peaceful and reflective service.

Speaking of evening services, we are thrilled that we will soon hold Choral Evensong again. Two weeks after Easter, we will celebrate this service together with the Nidaros Cathedral Choir and cantor. Our Senior Chaplain, Darren McCallig, will join us for this service.

We celebrate The Paschal Triduum in our usual way: Maundy Thursday with footwashing, in a bilingual service together with *Bymisjonen* and the Nidaros Cathedral and Vår Frue congregation. Good Friday with Trondheim Christian Council's ecumenical city walking service –

marking the stations of the cross and praying for our city, and Easter Morning in Vår Frue Church.

In May, we will again participate in the Archbishop of Canterbury's *Thy Kingdom Come* initiative by holding a Pray Walk on 15 May. We will break our tradition of holding Pentecost at Fjellseter Chapel this year and will keep to our morning/evening rhythm, holding that day in Thomas Angell's Chapel (where we are each first Sunday in the month this semester, while the Cathedral Chapter House is being renovated). However, on Trinity Sunday, 27 May, we will gather at Fjellseter for a morning service and Bring and Share community meal.

Stavanger notes

Hello everyone, greetings from Stavanger. At the end of December we had some challenging news: Stavanger Domkirke, who owns our building, had sold it and that we had to leave! By the time you read this, therefore, we will be in new premises.

It is the end of an era for us. The congregation in Stavanger is over 50 years old and about twenty years ago the Domkirke took over the Bethel building. We became the worshipping community who used it on a Sunday morning. The building has served us well for many years but it's now time to make a change.

Bethel provided us with a flexible worship space, catering facilities, extra rooms for running our Children's church, (which at its height had four groups running) as well as office and storage space.

Our challenge has been to find an affordable space that best suits our needs. A survey of our regular congregation identified that we want, ideally, a city centre venue that provides a flexible worship space for up to eighty people, that we can use on Sunday mornings and has access to additional rooms for our Children's church. It must also be possible to make and share refreshments after the services. We also need office and storage space for our chaplain and the church resources. All for about the same cost or less as we are paying now.

It is proving to be a big challenge to find somewhere that fulfils all our ideals, but we are already getting several options that come close.

As Lent draws near we will be having special services in the Bishop's chapel and the Cathedral, on Ash Wednesday, Maundy Thursday (Footwashing) and Good Friday (reflections). We will also be following a weekly series of home study for Lent.

Do hold us in your prayers and by the next issue we will report about our new home.

December, in particular, brought in its wake plenty of action. With carol services in St Edmund's and in Bragermes Church (Drammen) as well as Christingle and Nativity services there was plenty to organise and undertake in the weeks coming up to Christmas. Many thanks to all those who helped to plan and lead the services which, I hope, provided plentiful opportunities for reflection and inspiration to those who attended.

Then, in the new year, we took contemplation and action onto the streets of Oslo with the annual ecumenical Church Walk during the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity. Along with our sisters and brothers in the Swedish, Greek Orthodox, Roman Catholic and Lutheran Churches we sang hymns and psalms as we trudged the icy pavements between the five churches in our neighbourhood, before entering each building for shared prayers and – at the final stop – gratefully received refreshments.

And now, as we enter the season of Lent, prayer is once again our focus, not only at our Sunday morning worship but also at our Lenten Book Group. This year we will reflect together on *Say it to God: In Search of Prayer* by Luigi Gioia. This book, which is the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lenten recommendation, has been described as a 'welcome encouragement to all those who feel the need to freshen their practice of prayer' – a description which I dare say, applies to most, if not all, of us.

Another Lenten activity this year will be led by our Youth Group, who will sell 'Real Easter Eggs' in aid of the Shearly Cripps Children's Home in Zimbabwe. The 'real' element of these eggs is that they are the only ones which are Fairtrade and come with a copy of the Easter story in the box. A limited number of Real Easter Eggs will be available for purchase in the crypt during Sunday morning church coffee time. Finally, we will also have our traditional Lenten lunches of soup and bread during the pre-Easter season – proceeds again in aid of Shearly Cripps.

All in all, the weeks ahead promise to be a time of both contemplation and action. Through it all, may we be given the grace to relax into the reality of being loved by God, in order to rise into the realism of loving others.

Looking Ahead

on Sunday 4 March and we again thank our 'puppet masters' Guy and Coral Morgan.

Bishop David Hamid will be with us at Saint Edmund's on Sunday 17 June to preside at a Service of Confirmation. Anyone considering confirmation should make contact with the Chaplain so that they can join the preparation classes for this important rite.

Spiritual direction - what's the point?

Most, if not all, of the dioceses in the C of E now have spiritual advisers and teams of spiritual directors, and our Diocese in Europe is no exception. About 3 years ago I was invited to join in a training course to learn about this work with a small group from all over our diocese. I already had experience from my local Norwegian diocese of Nidaros, and had felt drawn to this kind of work for some time. That first group is now fully trained and a second group on the way.

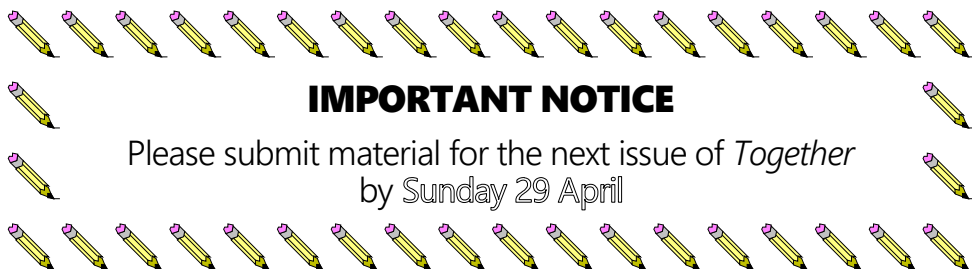
The term 'spiritual director' is not universally popular, and is much discussed. The danger is that it may sound as if there are experts out there who want to examine you and to tell you what to do – an intimidating thought for many of us! But think of the word 'director' not in terms of 'authoritative boss', but more in terms of 'sign-post' or 'map-reader'.

When a spiritual director meets with a 'directee', (i.e. anyone who would like to talk about their relationship with God with someone they believe to be experienced and trust-worthy), they meet on an equal footing. No one believes they know the mind of God or the 'truth' about the other person. Rather, you enter into an agreement where you both seek to listen to each other and to God, to be honest and considerate in your use of words, and to provide a safe space for thoughts, questions and experiences to be shared and to be better understood. Miracles are not expected, nor clear-cut answers, but there is a commitment to care and to be constructive.

Director and directee meet on an equal footing, because it is God who is the true and only director. But the director is there for the directee, and not the other way round. Everyone in our church who acts as a spiritual director commits themselves to receiving regular direction themselves, and to be accountable to other trained supervisors. Freedom is key to these relationships. We are all responsible for our own lives, but sometimes it can be beneficial to share our thoughts and concerns (you don't have to feel you have 'big problems'), with someone else. Sometimes just putting things words on to our vague feelings can provide valuable insights!

By the way, in our large diocese, spiritual direction via Skype is a practical possibility!

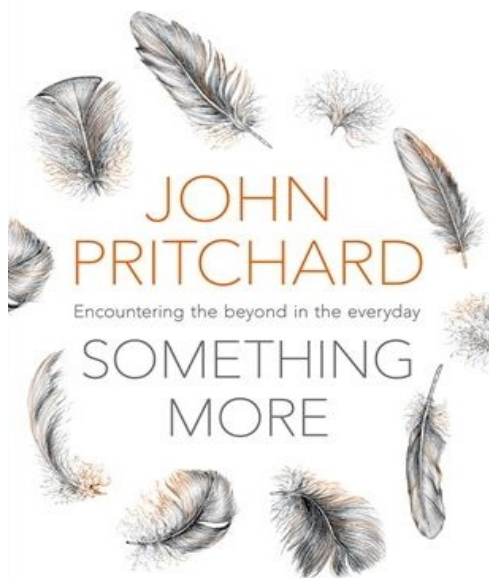

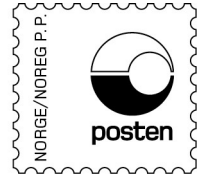
