The Senior Chaplain's Notes

A greeting from the new Senior Chaplain to everyone at the Anglican Church in Norway



A few days ago Bishop David Hamid wrote to me to formally invite me to be the next Senior Chaplain of the Anglican Church in Norway. It is a great honour, and I am very grateful to those involved in the selection process for the trust they have placed in me.

I look forward to continuing in the long line of faithful priests who have served the Anglican Church in Norway over the past decades. I have already met the Assistant Chaplains – April, Kirk and Peter – and I am looking forward to getting to know you all in the different worship locations across the country.

The links between the Chaplaincy in Denmark (where I currently serve) and the Chaplaincy in Norway are many and deep. For example, the Danish-born Queen Alexandra (wife of King Edward VII of England) who was so instrumental in the building of Saint Alban's Church in Copenhagen, was the mother of Queen Maud (wife of Haakon VII) who played such a pivotal role in the life of Saint Edmund's Church in Oslo.

I am also discovering many connections between my home country of Ireland and my future home in Norway. Apart from the Viking influence, there is also the lesser-known link through Saint Sunniva. Believed to have been the daughter of an Irish king, Sunniva settled on the island of Selja in Western Norway some time in the tenth century. Later martyred for her faith, she became the patron saint of Bjørgvin diocese and of Western Norway.

The fact that – as far as I am aware – I will be the first Church of Ireland priest to serve as Senior Chaplain in Norway underlines just what a diverse and international Chaplaincy it has become. I am told that there are members from over thirty different countries on the books, and my hope and prayer is that we can continue to be an inclusive, Christ-centred community which reflects the generosity and unconditional love of God.

I will be moving to Oslo in October and my first Sunday service at Saint Edmund's will be on Sunday 8 October. In the meantime, I ask for your prayers as I make preparations to leave Denmark.

As we say in Ireland, 'Go mbeannaí Dia sibh go léir'- 'May God bless you all.'

Bergen notes

Greetings from rainy Bergen everyone! I doubt you will be surprised to hear that Bergen broke new records this summer for precipitation! Hurrah! For example, it rained every day from 1 June to 26 June. It had not rained for this many consecutive days in June since 1968. The record was broken on a Sunday (with one of the strongest and longest down pours of the month I might add) and our music director Roger Martin was quick to encourage us to look on the bright side of life by reminding us that because it constantly rains in Bergen, everything always has a very nice cleansing! Roger's good humour was therapeutic, but also deeply theological. When the rain seems relentless in Bergen, just like the inevitable challenges and obstacles that come in ministry, it is indeed important to remind ourselves that while it might be difficult to see God's faithful hand at work, God may be most active during these times by renewing and preparing us for what is still ahead. And also to count our blessings daily which always outnumber the negative experiences we encounter in ministry. While all the rain in Bergen was certainly challenging for many of us during the summer months, we had many bright spots in ministry as we witnessed God's renewing presence in our midst.

The summer began with our International Potluck Dinner for Newcomers in early June. This was a wonderful gathering of both newcomers and current members with many delicious dishes shared from around the world. This meal granted us the very interesting experience of hearing about how newcomers had made their way to Bergen for work, education or love, and have somehow managed to remain in Bergen despite

all the rain! This meal also reminded us of how God is blessing us with an increasingly diverse community of faith as we welcomed people from Kenya, the Philippines, Canada, and the United States.

In addition, being able to hold services in St. Mary's throughout the summer in what is arguably the most beautiful church in Bergen, if not in all of Norway, is a tremendous blessing from the One above. Once inside, you quickly forget about how ugly the weather is outside! Just like last summer, we also welcomed in large crowds of visitors from all over the world to our Sunday services and were given the opportunity to help sustain these sojourners in the life of the Spirit during their travels. As the summer comes to a close, we realise that new blessings still await us even though the rains continue here in Bergen and the days begin to slowly grow shorter as the winter darkness makes its return. We look forward to the leadership of our new Senior Chaplain Revd Darren McCallig and welcoming him to Bergen! We also look forward to our Harvest Festival on 1 October, our joint ecumenical service together with the Norwegian congregation on 19 November, and we eagerly await our carol services in December. While we certainly do not wish for any more records to be broken here in Bergen with precipitation, we know that we will always have to cope with the rain. What is important for us is to remember its cleansing properties and to be attentive to God's renewing work among us. As God declares in the book of Revelations, 'Behold, I will make all things new!'(21:5).

This year, our Sunday away to the chapel at Brekko was a welcome back after the summer break instead of the usual end of spring trip. It rained, but no one minded as there was a dry shelter, a cosy café and lots of good BBQ food after the service.

We are going to try and start early this year with publicity and resources for our regular shoebox appeal for operation Christmas child. Last year we sent about 350 shoeboxes filled with gifts as Christmas presents for underprivileged children in Romania. We hope to do better this year and already have several local churches joining us in our efforts.

We wish you all every blessing this autumn and may God be with you.

We will meet on Thursdays from 6-7:30pm to discuss themes from the book *Good Grief* by Revd. Granger E. Westberg. 'Good Grief' has been described thus: 'Whether mourning the death of a loved one, the end of a marriage, the loss of a job, or other difficult life changes, *Good Grief* is a proven steady companion in times of loss.' Revds Mary & April will then lead together our All Saints Holy Communion Service in the Chapter House at 18:00 on 5 November, where those who wish will have the opportunity to light candles of remembrance and prayer. This group is free and open to all who would like to join us.

Editing Outpost

There is a need for volunteers to be involved in the editing and production of our quarterly magazine. It is fair to assume that the task of editor-in-chief will continue to be taken by the senior chaplain, but this is a plea for more people to help.

For the past five years or so I have been doing most of the editing of Outpost. I started by offering to help Sammy, who had taken over the task from Janet. Then when Sammy left I ended up with most of the responsibility alone.

I already have quite a few commitments in the church in Bergen, and am finding that Outpost is a bit more than I can manage to my own satisfaction. You may have noticed that the last couple of issues – including this one – did not come out until a while into the period they were supposed to cover – one symptom of an editorial staff of one! An editorial staff of two or three people would be ideal.

What would an editorial staff do?

The main tasks are

- to receive notes from the four regular chaplains and any other people who would like to contribute; to proofread and when necessary condense these contributions.
- to compile the calendar of services (with readings) in the four main churches
- to receive and include entries from the registers (provided by the senior chaplain)
- to find and select an illustration for the front cover (not difficult)
- to place all the above in a readable (and hopefully attractive) format

There are also a few occasional or optional tasks:

- to update the deadline for contributions to the next issue
- to include small adverts
- to compile a list of important events
- to find and include other material to fill what little space is left!

Who are the people in an ideal team?

- a nerd or a graphic artist: someone with a bit of computer savvy who can deal with layout
- a writer: someone who is good with words who can proofread and condense if necessary
- an organiser: someone who can compile the calendar (each time) and update Who's Who (as necessary), and perhaps be the one who keeps everyone else on track. It may be that a clerical employee of the church has this as one of their duties.

This could be one, two or three people (or more). The list above, with the addition of a little musical competence, is about the sum total of all my own skills. It would be more enjoyable, I expect, if the skills were divided amongst several people, so the task would not be a solitary one.

Does all the team need to be in the same place?

I see no reason why not, but with electronic communication as it is these days, there is no reason either why there should not be one person in Tromsø, one in Stavanger and one in Trondheim. Or anywhere else for that matter, including people who are too far away from one of our churches to be able to attend regularly – a wonderful way to keep your finger on the pulse.

I would like to complete a hand-over in time for the December 2017–February 2018 issue, but am willing to be involved in passing on information and 'training' in the skills involved in a transitional period. I am sure a face-to-face meeting could be arranged (I can offer hospitality in the Bergen area if that is the best place), and if there are a few volunteers (I am hoping and praying, and am sure you will join me in doing so), it could be quite a lot of fun.
